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The Economic Opportunity Act

In 1964, The Great Society, as envisioned by President Lyndon Johnson, was a sweeping plan to improve the lives of all Americans, regardless of their circumstances. Inspired by President Kennedy and his New Frontier, Johnson pledged to fulfill his promise of equal opportunity for all by enacting several comprehensive changes within the federal government. In August of that same year, the *Economic Opportunity Act* was signed into law by President Johnson creating the nationwide Community Action Network. There are now over 1000 Community Action Agencies throughout the United States and Puerto Rico in this coordinated effort to address the root effects of poverty and to, ultimately, move families and individuals to self-sufficiency.

"Win, Lose or Draw; The War on Poverty 50 Years Later"

Presidents have often used the declaration of "war" to signify their administration's intent to eradicate a social ill. President Reagan brought us the war on drugs, President Nixon brought us the war on crime, and 50 years ago President Johnson brought us the war on poverty. As many of us know the war on poverty gave birth to community action. It stands now as one of the most aggressive platforms against poverty in the history of this country, possibly second only to "The New Deal" of FDR. However, 50 years later, poverty is still with us. This brings forth the question for many, "Was the war on poverty lost?" Fortunately, we can dig deeper and provide an answer to that question.


A report released by the President's Council of Economic Advisers entitled "The War on Poverty 50 Years Later: A

Progress Report" sheds light on the progress we have made in the last 50 years. This report asserts that poverty rates have decreased by 1/3, down to a 50-year low of 16 percent in 2012 despite the Great Recession of the late 2000's. This has been achieved through antipoverty programs that have traditionally garnered rare bipartisan support such as; tax credits for low income families, food and nutrition assistance programs, and unemployment insurance. Additionally, program such as Pell Grants and Head Start have made education more accessible to low-income families than ever before¹. Community action has been on the front lines of this fight from day one. Nearly, every president since President Johnson has attempted to limit the capacity of community action. Despite this, there are more than 900 community action agencies serving low income communities across the country. These agencies overcome local, statewide, and national obstacles to fulfill their purpose with no signs of slowing².

However, all is not well in the "Great Society". 13.4 million children in the United States are currently living in circumstances of poverty. Additionally, class mobility is at an all-time low, less than half of all low income people make it out of the lowest income quintile¹, despite the wealth of programs that help people living in poverty maintain a respectable quality of life. So while we have come a very long way, we still have far to go before we achieve the "Great Society".

ow well do you know the town of Biloxi, Mississippi? Here are some trivia facts to see if you know one of the Gulf Coast's oldest cities.

- Biloxi's population has been decreasing since Hurricane Katrina displaced many of its residents.
- Before Hurricane Katrina, Biloxi was Mississippi's third-largest city.
- After Hurricane Katrina, Hattiesburg is now Mississippi's third largest city.
- · Biloxi lies on the Mississippi Sound.
- One nickname for Biloxi is Buck City.
- Biloxi's history spans more than 300 vears.
- Biloxi was originally part of Old French Louisiana.
- In 1817, Mississippi was admitted to the US.
- One of the best-known features is the Biloxi Lighthouse that was built in Baltimore, Maryland and shipped in May 1848.
- During the early Civil War, Ship Island was captured by Union Forces who then captured Biloxi.
- Biloxi suffered no direct damage from the Union capture.
- After the Civil War, Biloxi became a vacation spot again.
- · In 1881, the first cannery was established.
- The cannery business and seafood factories brought in many different groups from around the world, and diversified Biloxi's population.

- · In World War II, the US built Keelser Air Force Base as a basic training site and a site for aircraft to be stored.
- In the 1940s, the casino industry began but it was still illegal at the time.
- The first gambling casino was Broadwater Beach Resort.
- Biloxi became known as the Poor Man's Riviera.
- · In the 1960s, Biloxi became a prime destination of Northern travelers who sought an alternative to Florida.
- · Biloxi brought in chefs from France and Switzerland to cater to its new Northern vacationers.
- In 1990, Mississippi made gambling legal, and Biloxi was transformed again.
- Biloxi became an important center for gambling casinos, and became a leading gambling center in the US.
- · By 2000, the economy was based around gambling, gaming, seafood and tourism.
- · Hurricane Katrina hit Biloxi on August 29, 2005 at 6:56 am.
- · All the coastal churches in Biloxi were damaged by Hurricane Katrina.
- Katrina was worse than Hurricane Camille in 1969.
- · Casinos were ripped off supports and thrown inland.

- Some casinos and barges landed on top of many antebellum and historic homes and completely crushed them. There was nothing to save of these homes and they were demolished. Old photographs were all that remained of these once majestic homes.
- Around 40 casinos have re-opened.
- There is a memorial to Katrina victims in Biloxi placed there by Extreme Makeover: Home Edition.
- Biloxi is home to the Mississippi Surge, a minor league hockey team.
- · Actress Jessica Alba in a native of Biloxi.
- Former President of the Confederacy Jefferson Davis lived and died in Biloxi. His home sustained much damage during Katrina. It has now been restored and a museum is being planned.
- · Singer Jimmy Buffet is a native of Biloxi.
- Many John Grisham novels are set in Biloxi, including Runaway Jury, The Summons, The Firm, The Partner, and The Last Juror.
- · Biloxi was referred to by F. Scott Fitzgerald in The Great Gatsby. •

Biloxi Lighthouse (at left) One of the first cast-iron lighthouses built in the South, the Biloxi Lighthouse is one of the city's most revered landmarks. If you want to tour the general area, you'll have to get there early; the city operates only three tours daily Monday through Saturday from 9 to 9:30 a.m. Admission starts at \$5 for adults but group tours are available by appointment only.

Ship Island About 12 miles off the coast of Biloxi, Ship Island is a popular daytrip for families. Once there, you can relax on the beach with its glistening white sands, or you can take a tour of the tactically located Fort Massachusetts, built to defend the coast following the War of 1812. You can catch a ferry at Gulfport's dock on Beach Boulevard for about \$24 round trip

Beauvoir Beauvoir was the retirement home of Confederate President Jefferson Davis, and it's a must-see for Civil War enthusiasts. The main residence – a Louisiana-raised, cottage-style plantation with a smaller, single-room east cottage – has been lovingly cared for by the Mississippi Division of the Sons of the Confederate Veterans. The Beauvoir grounds are located right off of the city's beach on Biloxi Boulevard. The grounds are open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tours start at \$9,

Encouraging "Dad-ness" In Tennessee

MORRISTOWN, TN - Dads matter! That's the message of a program that helps fathers in East Tennessee. TEAM DAD assists low-income fathers to become self-sufficient and improve their parenting skills.

Program Director Richard Beaty says the goal is to give men tools to use so they can become what they all want to be -agreat dad.

"Each dad is the most important man in the whole world to his children and has enormous influence on their lives," says Beaty.

There is a need for dads to be more involved. One in three children is growing up without their biological father. Those children are more likely to be poor, drop out of school, and engage in risky behavior. On the other hand, when engaged, loving fathers are in the home, children are more likely to be successful according to Beaty.

TEAM DAD is part of Douglas-Cherokee Economic Authority, Inc., a community action agency located in Morristown, Tennessee, with over a dozen programs that help families living in poverty improve their lives by offering assistance and services they are not able to provide for themselves. Douglas-Cherokee serves six rural Appalachian counties in East Tennessee-Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe and Sevier.

TEAM DAD helps men through job coaching, parenting classes from a guy's perspective, and connecting men to community resources that address personal issues. The program co-hosts family events such as a Daddy-Daughter Hoe-Down and recognizes "Random Acts of Dad-ness" by rewarding men engaged in positive fatherhood in the community. Donated bicycles are given to participants without reliable transportation. Its free services are also offered to inmates in county jails. •

A Man, A Boy, And A Home Western Carolina Community Action Association, NC

Ryan was "couch surfing" when his son, Ackee, came to live with him from another county, leaving an unstable situation with Ackee's mother. Ryan worked part time at Pizza Hut. His earnings weren't enough for him to provide a home and the basic essentials for his son. He knew he needed to take the responsibility of caring for his son as a single father. PLAN, a United Way funded program, and an enhancement of WCCA's Self-Sufficiency program, empowered Ryan to help himself and his family. Basically, PLAN jump-starts families on the path to self-reliance by tackling dependency on all fronts and replacing powerlessness with the opportunity for a better future. Ryan's story is a great example of how PLAN works.

In September of 2013, Ryan was referred to us through HELP, which is the homeless education linkages program in Hendersonville, NC. Ryan needed a place of his own in order for his son to flourish in school. He found a home in Etowah, which was perfect because

his son did not have to switch schools. Thanks to United Way funding of our PLAN (Preparing, Learning, Applying Now), WCCA assisted Ryan with the initial deposit, several months of rent, and electricity.

Ryan's vehicle was very important in his efforts to become self-sustaining since he didn't live near the public transit system. It was a long and trying struggle, with his car breaking down often. Through the PLAN program, WCCA provided gas cards and some car repairs. When Ryan received his tax refund, he bought a dependable car. Having reliable transportation was a huge financial relief for Ryan. To save on the cost of gas, Ryan decided to move closer to his job and other resources. Once again, WCCA assisted with the initial costs of the relocation. However, Ryan's progress allows him to pay his own rent and utilities. Working with his caseworker at WCCA, Ryan searched tirelessly for a better paying, full-time job. He held

down two part-time jobs until he was given the opportunity to work full-time.

Through the careful guidance of his caseworker, Ryan learned how to manage his finances and maintain a budget. He leveraged his resources to increase his financial stability and self-reliance. Thanks to the support Ryan received through PLAN, a United Way funded program, Ryan is now working full-time and has a sustainable, stable home for his son. •

Partnerships to Opportunity

For over 20 years, Hope Enterprise Corporation / Hope Credit Union (HOPE) have been working with partners to build pathways to economic security. In recent years, some of the more fruitful partnerships have included work with Community Action

Agencies (CAA). The CAA mission of self-sufficiency and self-empowerment resonates deeply with HOPE's mission to provide access to high quality financial products and services in economically distressed areas.



For example, this year, the Hinds County Human

Resource Agency (HCHRA) formed a relationship with HOPE to provide financial counseling to HCHRA clients. Through the partnership, HOPE team members visited job center sites twice a month to speak with job seekers about their financial needs. Once HCHRA clients were introduced to the HOPE team, many continued to work with the HOPE staff to establish and rebuild their credit. Others joined the credit union and took advantage of HOPE's Borrow and Save product that helps individuals improve their credit and save money for an emergency or future purchase.

Over the last four years, HOPE has also regularly attended orientation meetings held at the Gulf Coast Community Action Agency (GCCAA) in Mississippi. During the
